Coercive control

Law Enforcement and Crime Team September 2022

- Joint Select Committee (JSC) on coercive control (2021) released report – 23 recommendations
- NSW Government response supported 17 recommendations and committed to criminalising coercive control in current and former intimate partner relationships in 2022



- NSW Government released an Exposure
 Draft Bill 20 July 2022
- Bill drew from the findings of the JSC, cognate law in England and Wales and Scotland
- Early consultation undertaken with criminal law specialists prior to release



- Bill proposes five elements for the offence
- 1. Adult undertakes course of conduct
- 2. Abusive behaviour
- 3. Against current or former intimate partner
- 4. Adult intends or is reckless as to causing physical or mental harm
- 5. A reasonable person would consider the course of conduct likely to cause fear of violence or have a serious impact on day to day activities
- Defence of reasonable in all of the circumstances
- Bill proposes a definition of domestic abuse for the purposes of the ADVO regime



- Consultation period 6 weeks
- NSW DCJ held 27 roundtables/targeted meetings with:
 - DVF, disability, older persons, LGBTQIA+ sectors;
 - Victim-survivors (pending)
 - Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander women and organisations, including regional (Kempsey and Dubbo)



- NSW Government received 123 written submissions from members of the public, of which 54 (44%) from victim/survivor of coercive control – majority supported the Bill
- NSW Government received 70 submissions from stakeholder organisations – mixed support.



- Main concerns:
 - Timing for consultation insufficient
 - Suggest independent oversight required
 - Limit to intimate partners
 - Misidentification of primary aggressor
 - Concurrent need for police training and culture-change



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- Next steps:
 - NSW Government considers all feedback
 - Introduction of Bill to Parliament (Oct/Nov)
 - Delayed commencement of likely more than 12 months
